- 1. Confidentiality and Privacy: Nurses are responsible for maintaining patient confidentiality and privacy. They should safeguard patients' personal health information and only disclose it to authorized individuals for appropriate reasons.
- 2. Honesty and Trustworthiness: Nurses should be honest and truthful in their interactions with patients, colleagues, and other healthcare professionals. They should provide accurate information, acknowledge their limitations, and seek assistance when necessary.

### **Nursing Professionalship**

- 1. Professional Boundaries: Nurses must establish and maintain appropriate professional boundaries with patients, avoiding inappropriate relationships or conflicts of interest.
- **2. Cultural Sensitivity:** Nurses should respect and value their patients' diverse cultural backgrounds, beliefs, and values. They should provide culturally sensitive care that considers the individual needs and preferences of each patient.
- **3. Continuous Learning:** Nurses are responsible for engaging in lifelong learning, keeping up with advancements in healthcare, and enhancing their knowledge and skills to provide the best possible care. 


Figure 1: Knowledges Remark of Moral Development of Nursing Students
